

that we believe in the 'holy catholic church'?" Many will be quick to tell you that "catholic" simply means "universal," which is true, but it's a word with richer meaning than that, and we're very intentional in using it. It can also mean "all-inclusive," which is closer to what we mean. More than simply saying that there's a single "correct" communion among Christians, we confess that in Christ, God has formed a mystical community — the Communion of Saints — that is far broader than any single denomination could ever hope to embrace, united by God's grace beyond distinct theological differences. It's a confession of both hope and humility an acknowledgement that we trust that God can unite what we humans cannot and that we are given neither the right nor the burden of determining



ultimately who is included in God's catholic vision.

"manifestation", Epiphany is celebrated by both the Eastern and Western Churches, but a major difference between them is precisely which events the feast commemorates. For Western Christians, the feast

primarily commemorates the coming of the Magi, with only a minor reference to the baptism of Jesus and the miracle at the Wedding at Cana. Eastern churches celebrate the Baptism of Christ in the Jordan. In both traditions, the essence of the feast is the same: the manifestation of Christ to the world (whether as an infant or in the Jordan), and the Mystery of the Incarnation. The miracle at the Wedding at Cana is also celebrated during Epiphany as a first manifestation of Christ's public life. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America's recognizes the season of Epiphany the period from 6th January until the last Sunday before Ash Wednesday which is celebrated as the Transfiguration of our Lord. The length of the season of Epiphany varies and is determined by working backwards through the season of Lent from the moveable date for the celebration of Easter. Among the principal themes are: the revelation of Christ to all nations, Jesus' baptism in the River Jordan, and Christ as the light of the world. The colors of the season are white (a color associated with the festivals of Christ and suggesting gladness, joy and light for the day of Epiphany), used the first week after the Epiphany when the Baptism of our Lord is celebrated, and the last week of the season of Epiphany when the Transfiguration of our Lord is celebrated; The color green, reminiscent of living plants and suggests spiritual growth is used in the season of Epiphany beginning with the second week after the Epiphany until the week before the Transfiguration of our Lord is celebrated. On January 12th we will celebrate the Baptism of our Lord by recognizing the Bantisms of that have taken place since the Bantism of our

From the Desk of Cantor JB George... The Morning Star of Our Dark World

After the whirlwind of December activities, culminating in the twelve-day festival celebrating Christ's birth, we come back to regular, everyday schedules. It's still cold and dark, decorations have come down, and the mood has changed.

Maybe, for some, this change is welcome. Christmas can be stressful for anyone, and for those who grieve a recent loss, especially so. Our Blue Christmas service acknowledged that and provided a quiet place in the middle of the noise of the season.

Now we have come to "Ordinary Time" in the church year. The Holy Child within the Manger grows up quickly in the church year, and by January 12, we see the adult Jesus Christ beginning his ministry in our Sunday Gospel readings. There is nothing ordinary about it, though. These "Ordinary Sundays" after Epiphany explore ways in which God-Among-Us, delivered at Christmas, has changed everything.

Remembering God's presence among us is a help through the dark days of January, and God's promises are a light to our hearts through any difficult times. Many have been inspired by the "Footprints" poem, where we find out after the fact, that Jesus has carried us through the most difficult times of life.

Another way of expressing this trust is in the great hymn, "O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright" (ELW #308/LBW #76). "For Christ goes with us all the way—today, tomorrow, every day!" and "What joy to know when life is past, the Lord we love is first and last..." (from stanzas 5 and 6)

As Christ fed the multitudes, the mission of the Historical Grace Lutheran Church Food Pantry is to feed the hungry.

In November of 2019, we served 563 families composed of 1,171 individuals compared to 564 families composed of 1,215 individuals in 2018. We are again on track to serve over 13,000 individuals this year.

Our beginning balance for November was \$27,589.70. We had receipts of \$14,728.52, expenses of \$8,422.52, and a closing balance of \$33,895.77. We were the recipients of \$2,500 from the Community Foundation of the Land of Lincoln including gifts from the Kellner Charitable Fund, the Loken Family Fund, and the Michael and Sandy Barker Family Fund. We also received an anonymous donation of \$2,800 from a member of St. John's.

We have benefited from numerous food drives during November. Our Savior's School had a food drive and contributed about 1500 items right before Thanksgiving. Franklin School's food drive collected about 500 items with more expected in December. St. John's contributed more than 3,800 items from their food drive. Trinity Lutheran School had a food drive and contributed about 625 items. There have been a number of donations of fresh fruit from Rotary members as well.

There are numerous community groups, churches, and individuals who donate and have drives on behalf of the Food Pantry. There were so many different generous donors these months before Christmas and I will make sure I include more in next month's Grace notes.

Thank you to everyone who volunteers, donates, or prays for the Food Pantry and our clients. Everyone is needed!

BUTTER BRAIDS...We sold 331 items. A year ago we sold 224 items. The profit of \$684.40 was distributed to a number of local social service agencies. One lady bought 10 butter braids to give for Christmas gifts. Another customer who moved to Arkansas last summer called and said her family was so disappointed they wouldn't have butter braids for Christmas she wanted to order some and have her son who lives in Springfield pick them up. Because Thrivent gave us money to cover expenses associated with the breakfast we served when we packed cookies for the homebound WELCA purchased 4 butter braids. This semiannual fundraiser which we have done for 13 years is successful because so many people help. Velma Lawson maintains the list of 77 nonmembers who purchase butter braids and sends them emails about upcoming sales. Deb Wakefield prepared the order form. Gene Blade always does an excellent job of packaging the orders. Pat Ekle distributed orders to non-members. She does a wonderful job of greeting people in her friendly way, she double checks every order she distributes to make sure it is correct and she keeps an accurate account of the money as it comes in. Gary Courtwright delivered 3 orders to people who could not pick them up because of health problems. We really appreciate the food pantry volunteers who make room for the butter braids in the freezers and allow us to work around them as we get organized.

TWISTED STITCHERS...Is a group of ladies that get together the first Tuesday evening of the month in someone's home and have an evening of fellowship and stitching crafts (knitting, crochet, cross-stich, quilting or anything else).


