We use the image of the saints wearing white robes especially as we celebrate All Saints Day and the fulfillment of God's Kin-dom. I love this image, as it also relates to our baptism: Christ covers us in love and forgiveness throughout our lives and in time to come.

In our tradition, pastors, assisting ministers, communion assistants, choir, cantors, and assisting cantors all wear robes as they serve the assembly. There is yet another beautiful imagery in our robes: they are not academic or government/judicial robes, as in some church traditions; they are *servant* robes. Our robes are neither a fancy color (they are unbleached linen) nor a fancy style (the choir appreciates the simplicity). We are here to serve as we lead.

Our current set of choir/assisting minister robes was purchased in 2007. They have worn well, for the most part, but a few need replacement and a few sizes are in short supply (usually meaning a scramble right before worship!) Thanks to Janet Conrady's help organizing them, we have a good catalog of robes we already have. Thanks to a recent gift by Betty Webb, we will be able to purchase additional robes. The company that makes them still has that exact style, and it is a good match. The factory is in Maine, so we will not likely have major supply chain issues.

Just as washing our face and hands can be a frequent reminder of our baptism, when I put on my robe, I am reminded both of my baptism and my calling to serve others through music.

FOOD PANTRY REPORT

As Christ fed the multitudes, the mission of the Grace Lutheran Church Food Pantry is to feed the hungry.

September was a pretty stable month compared to a year ago --499 households and 1,117 individuals served compared with 454 households and 1,184 individuals served in September 2020. This would seem to indicate that we are now getting apples to apples comparisons each month that are not skewed by the impact of the pandemic. That said, our annual statistics for 2021 will be down vs. 2020 because 2020 had three months pre-pandemic, and both 2021 and 2020 will be down vs. 2019 because of the pandemic. (Note: One of the reasons the pandemic reduced our client numbers has been the temporary increases in certain financial and food stamp benefits and stimulus payments that helped our clients.)

Year-to-date through September 30, we had served 3,341 house-holds, a decrease of 8 percent from 2020, and 8,025 individuals, a decrease of 4 percent from 2020.

Children make up 37 percent of this year's clients, and seniors account for 25 percent.

Financially, September was boosted by income of \$7,042 from the August 29 golf outing -- well in excess of the \$5,000 goal we had set when we first started planning this event back in early 2020. Thanks again to Jim Hobbs for his leadership on this.

For the year, donations of \$72,602 have exceeded expenses of \$67,429 by \$5,173, leaving us with a Sept. 30 account balance of \$83,412. Absent the income from the golf outing, expenses would exceed donations by \$1,869. Based on our current position, we should be able to continue providing bread, milk and eggs for all clients indefinitely, and we'll continue to add items like toothpaste, toothbrushes, shampoo and deodorant to the personal bags unless and until the balance is drawn down significantly.

In short, client services are very stable, and enhancements we've made this year appear sustainable for the foreseeable future. Finances continue to be strong with a big boost from the golf outing, from a monthly donation from First Presbyterian that is new this year, and from the ongoing and consistent generosity of the churches and members of Grace, St. John's and Peace that always anchor our finances.

Perhaps as important as any recent development, we have been blessed to add several new volunteers from Grace -- Josie Anderson, Fran Appleton, Art Carlson, Robin Mahnken and Rosie O'Fallon. -- to work our outdoor distribution setup. They have been a game-changer for meeting our volunteer staffing needs. Doug McFarlan, Director

Financial Update:

At our January 2021 congregational meeting, we adopted a budget for 2021 with a projected **\$47,617 deficit**. In April, the Church Council sent all members a letter requesting that they consider increasing giving to help reduce the projected deficit. The Council would like to brief the congregation on the status of the projected deficit.

As of September 30, the Church is running a **\$47,786 deficit**, which is actually higher than the deficit budgeted for the entire year. In the remaining three months of 2021, we will continue to pay routine monthly expenses (e.g., payroll and fringe benefits, utilities, etc.) which will further increase the deficit (much like what occurred from January through September).

While the size of the deficit at the end of September is not ideal, there are several positive trends that are occurring. First, in prior years, coming out of the summer months, member giving has been below what was budgeted. However, this year, member giving is closely on pace with the amount budgeted: member giving is at 74 percent of the total current and building income budgeted for 2021 (\$290,000 budgeted and \$214,617 given), and September 30 marks the 3/4 point in the year.

Second, in responding to our April appeal to consider increasing regular giving, members have given \$15,070 to the Deficit Reduction Account established to receive contributions designated by members for deficit reduction. Without this additional giving, the deficit would have stood at \$62,000 as of September 2021. Thank you for the additional giving to date to help reduce the deficit.

Third, later this year, we will receive our annual distribution from the Grace Trust which will be over \$50,000. Finally, some of the Church's programs will not spend all funds budgeted to them, which should also have a positive impact on our year-end financial position.

Hopefully the above information provides an update of where the Church's budget stands to date, as well as a perspective on some factors that will impact the budget in the remaining three months. Clearly, members have responded positively to the projected budgetary shortfall by keeping their regular contributions up-to-date, as well as making additional contributions to help address the budgeted deficit. Thank you for supporting the ministries of Grace.

YOUR HEALTH NEWS Parish Nurse...Diana Weyhenmeyer

I thought I would conclude the Alzheimer's articles by discussing what I learned from a two hour seminar titled, "Ministering to Those Who Live with Dementia and Those Who Love Them Through It." I watched it on Zoom last night and was sponsored by the Evangelical Lutheran Parish Nurse Association.

Two people mostly talked one was a navigator with many years of experience in this field and the other person was a nurse working with the elderly. One fact I found interesting is only 50% of Alzheimer's patients are actually diagnosed with the disease. Many are left undiagnosed.

The navigator said you really had to be a detective and look for clues when you first meet the client. For example the exterior of the house-how is the upkeep? Is the home is disrepair? She said she always asks to meet at the kitchen table with people. For one reason, this puts people at ease and she can observe the kitchen. Are dishes done or stacked up? This gives her a better picture of daily functioning of the household. Red flags for the navigator included the following:

- Paper clutter-people can't tell what is important so they save it all to go through and never go through it.
- Poor housekeeping inside the house. They have lost initiative to keep the house clean. The house may be in disrepair in the inside.
- The person's appearance may indicate a lack of personal hygiene and grooming. They forget easily and may not realize it has been a week or two without a bath or shower.
- Burned pots and pans can be easily seen in the kitchen. She often times checks the frig when the client allows this to happen. She looks for moldy food and frozen TV dinners are often times in the frig instead of the freezer. I remember when we cleaned out my father in law's fridge we found many moldy items.

Helpful tips included the following:

- People with dementia have a shuffling gate. Remove throw rugs and extension cords to prevent falls.
- * She was very much an advocate of handrails out of the shower placed sideways to help prevent falls and assist with getting out of the shower. Continues on Page 8

* Many with dementia have forgotten 911 to call in an emergency. She suggested doing the following to help them. Take a bright piece of construction paper and write with a magic marker on it: EMERGENCY 911. This was placed by every landline phone in the house. I thought that was an excellent idea to help people. This was done in case caregivers need help and the clients can see it.

It was a very good program and I enjoyed the education. I hope some of these ideas are helpful for you.

Though funded separately from Grace Food Pantry by Grace, Peace Lutheran and St Johns Lutheran, we use obtain the food through the pantry and reimburse it for the costs. Please consider donating to the Holiday Baskets, which cost about \$50 per basket. Grace pays for 60 baskets per holiday. That is \$3,000 for each of Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter. Each family receives a tote with about \$50 worth of groceries and personal items, including a ham, milk, bread, eggs, potatoes, apples, numerous non-perishable cans and boxes of food, and a bag of toiletries. You can support this ministry by donating cash (earmarked for Holiday Food Baskets) and/or the nonperishable foods listed below:

November Strategic Planning Committee Report

A lot of things are happening at Grace...

Representatives from the architectural/engineering firm of Berner Schober, LLC will be conducting a study of Grace's physical building. The study will involve five areas of review: architectural, structural, plumbing, electrical, and mechanical. The cost of the study is capped at \$10,000 and will result in a written long-range plan that will include immediate repairs/replacements and longer term, (1-year, 5-year, 10-year, and 20-year) projected building needs. This document will help our congregation, the standing committees, and the church council plan for the future of Grace. The final document should be ready for presentation at our next annual meeting. The work on this project is a combined effort with the Property Committee.

A tourist pamphlet has been developed. The pamphlet is in the final stages of development and will be placed outside Grace for tourists. This tourism pamphlet is distinct from the worship visitor pamphlet being developed by the Evangelism Committee.

The committee completed a demographic study of Grace's congregation. It shows a total of 389 members and 129 non-members that include 253 males and 265 females. The median (middle) age of the congregation is 51 years, the mean (average) age is 48.9 years, and the mode (age with the most members) is 71 years. This analysis has been shared with the church council and the standing committees to help them with planning.

Currently, the committee is considering developing a master building plan and an overall strategic plan for the church. As always, we would welcome church members to come and join the committee.
